Getting Started: IT at KSU

University Information Technology Services (UITS) is Kennesaw State University's IT division. We manage KSUmail, NetID, wireless and wired internet connections, and phones, as well as KSU-provided hardware such as laptops, tablets, and audio-visual equipment. UITS supports all Owls by ensuring University technology works seamlessly for you!

Username: NetID

NetID is the username for centralized access to KSU campus resources. It is formatted as the first initial of your first name and a portion of your last name, often followed by numerals. This username will be used to gain access to most campus-supported technologies.

Your NetID password expires vearly. You will receive email reminders to your KSU email address starting 30 days prior to the expiration date.


Two-Factor Authentication: Duo



Duo provides robust two-factor authentication to enhance the security of personal and university data for all Owls. With two-factor authentication, you will log into KSU services using your KSU email address and password, then you will securely confirm your identity via Duo on your phone or other mobile device. (See page 26.)

We strongly recommend registering more than one device because this will ensure easy access to multiple authentication methods in the event that you do not have access to your primary device.

Email: KSUmail

Your KSUmail address(NetID@kennesaw.edu) will be the primary way colleagues and students get in touch with you. Your KSUmail password is the same as your NetID password. You can set up KSUmail on your phone as well as your computer. (See page 08.)



Communications Technology

Communications technology is essential to delivering on KSU's commitment to fostering connectivity, innovation, and collaboration. The University's communication applications and infrastructure support diverse academic and research activities, enabling seamless interaction among students, faculty, and staff.

Email: KSUmail

You can sign in to KSUmail, the university-provided email service, on your computer, tablet, and phone. Your KSUmail username is [NetID]@kennesaw.edu, and your password is the same as your NetID password.

Getting Started with KSUmail

For your convenience and to serve your preferences, there are multiple methods of accessing your KSUmail account:

- Access KSUmail on the Web: ksumail.kennesaw.edu
- Outlook Desktop Client for PC and Mac—This is the method UITS recommends for faculty and staff accessing KSUmail from a non-shared office computer.
- Mail Client for Mac—Apple's built-in MacOS mail client
- **Default iOS and Android Mail Applications**—UITS recommends these methods for accessing KSUmail on your mobile devices.
- Outlook App for iOS and Android—Microsoft's dedicated Outlook application for mobile devices, available from your mobile device's app store.

For answers to common questions about KSUmail, search the Knowledge Base, where you can find short articles with answers to common technology questions.

Email is the official method of communication at KSU: all announcements and business-related correspondence are shared by official KSUmail accounts.





Microsoft Teams

KSU students, faculty, and staff can effortlessly communicate and collaborate using Microsoft Teams anytime and anywhere. Integrated with Microsoft 365, Teams makes it simple to chat, co-author documents, and hold virtual meetings, enhancing productivity and connectivity across our community.

Phone Services

Teams Calling

Managers of new employees are encouraged to sign employees up for Teams Calling rather than traditional desk phones. Because Teams Calling is fully integrated within Microsoft Teams, it provides flexible and easy-to-use service, enabling Owls to place and receive calls internally as well as externally.

How to Request Teams Calling for an Employee:

- 2 Select **Service Request**
- In the left-hand menu, select IT Equipment Services.
- Select Teams Calling Plan or Phone Request and complete the form to submit your request.



Cellular Devices and Services



All University-supported cellular devices and/ or service must have prior approval from the Chief Information Officer.

How to submit a request for prior approval:

- 1 Navigate to <u>uits.kennesaw.edu/</u> devices.
- 2 Determine whether you need only a device or a service plan, or both.
- Fill out the <u>Cellular Device and Service Request Form.</u>

Please note that in addition to the requestor, the requestor's supervisor and budget approver need to be named on the form and must sign the form.






Standard Technology Hardware

Standard Technology Hardware for Employees

Permanent full-time faculty and staff and limited-term faculty are eligible to receive a standard new computer and basic accompanying hardware including an external monitor, mouse, headset, and keyboard. This technology hardware is provided and paid for by UITS.

Part-time faculty and staff, including student assistants, are eligible to receive a gently used computer—please see below for more information about gently used technology equipment.

Once a new employee has accepted a job offer to work at KSU, their supervisor should submit a request for new technology hardware, and the equipment will be procured and delivered to them by UITS. Three options are available: Dell Bundle, Apple bundle, or custom* machine. All options come with standard accessories: monitor, mouse, and keyboard, and the equipment will be procured and delivered to them by UITS. Three options are available: Dell Bundle, Apple bundle, or custom* machine. All options come with standard accessories: monitor, mouse, and keyboard.



New Standard Technology Hardware

For your convenience, UITS stocks <u>standard</u> <u>technology hardware</u> to get it to you quickly. These items are available for departmental purchase. Once you select and submit technology hardware to purchase, your department's budget owner will receive a notification to approve your purchase. Once approved, we will process the order and contact you for delivery.

Additional <u>IT equipment</u>—including printers, tablets, computers, keyboards—is available for departmental purchase from UITS.

Gently Used Standard Technology Hardware

Faculty and staff can request gently used computers and other technology hardware through the <u>Technology Service Portal</u> at no departmental cost: <u>Gently Used IT Equipment Catalog</u>. Please provide a business justification as quantities are limited.

Please note that gently used technology hardware is available on a first-come, first-served basis, pending justification and stock. If we cannot fill your order, we will contact you to offer a replacement if one is available.



Standard Technology Hardware Checkout

Is your computer lost or being repaired? Faculty and staff can check out a laptop from UITS. Additionally, you (and your students) can check out audio/visual equipment, including podcast kits, GoPros, video and still cameras, microphones, tripods, and PA systems.

To check out technology equipment, log in to the <u>Technology</u> Checkout Portal and follow the prompts.

Please note: Reservations are recommended. Online reservations must be made at least 24 hours before the requested pickup time. Equipment requests made less than 24 hours in advance must be done in person.

Technology Replacement— Lifecycle Replacement (LCR)

The general useful life cycle of a computer at KSU is 5 years. When your computer is due for replacement, you will receive an LCR notification from UITS to kick off the replacement process.

If 5 years have passed and you have not received notification, or if you are having issues with your computer, you should initiate a service request for repair. UITS will determine whether the computer should be repaired or replaced.



Standard Software

KSU faculty and staff have a variety of software applications, which are available at <u>desktopsoftware.kennesaw.edu</u>.

How to Download Standard Software

Software is available for download at <u>desktopsoftware.kennesaw.edu</u>. To view and download this software, follow these instructions:

- Navigate to <u>desktopsoftware.kennesaw.</u> edu.
- 2 Log in with your KSUmail address and password.
- 3 Choose the software you plan to use for work.
- 4 A button on the top-right reads Add to Cart, Get Instructions, or Get Access.



- **a.** If the button says Add to Cart, click it to add the software to your cart, then view your cart and check out.
- **b.** If the button says Get Instructions, click it to open instructions for installing the software.
- **c.** If the button says Get Access, click it to be directed to an external site where you can access the software.

Non-Standard Technology Hardware and Software

In accordance with USG policy, UITS reviews all new technology hardware and software prior to purchase or rental to ensure it . . .

- Fits within the technology environment at KSU,
- 2 Does not pose a security risk, and
- Ooes not duplicate technology already available at the University.

If you need to purchase or rent non-standard technology hardware or non-standard software that has not previously been reviewed and approved by UITS, we must review it prior to purchase or rental to ensure it meets the three criteria above. That's where the UITS pre-purchase review and approval (AKA "Technology Approval") process comes in.



Technology Pre-Purchase Review and Approval (AKA "Technology Approval")

Q: What technology needs to be reviewed and approved by UITS?

A: Per USG policy, UITS is required to conduct a pre-purchase review of and approve all technology not previously approved for purchase or rental at KSU, including all...

- Hardware, including (but not limited to) computers, printers, scanners, displays, headphones, wireless presenters, webcams, audio/visual equipment such as cameras and microphones, and other technology accessories.
- Software not already provided standard by KSU (Please note that non-standard software is not supported by UITS.)

Q: When should requests for pre-purchase review and approval be submitted?

A: A request for technology pre-purchase review and approval must be requested after a quote has been received but before placing an order to purchase or rent technology. (See page 24 for more information about technology quotes.)

Q: How should I request a technology pre-purchase review and approval?

A: First, you will need a technology quote. Once you have a quote, you should submit a request for UITS to review and approve the technology by completing the <u>Technology</u> Approval form.



Technology Quotes

A technology quote is an estimate of how much technology should reasonably cost, and it is required before UITS can review and approve technology as required prior to purchase or rental (see page 23 for more information about technology pre-purchase review and approval).

Once you have a quote—but before purchasing or renting technology hardware or software—follow the instructions on the Technology Approval Form to request a technology pre-purchase review and approval from UITS, as required by the USG.

After UITS has reviewed the technology and you have received technology approval, you can order the approved technology through your department.

Two-Factor Authentication: Duo



Duo is KSU's two-factor authentication solution supporting the security of personal and university data for all Owls. Two-factor authentication is a method of confirming your identity using two separate elements: 1) Something you know (your NetID password), and 2) something you have (your registered mobile device or landline phone).

How to Set Up Duo

To set up Duo, use your computer to navigate to ksumail.kennesaw.edu. When you log in for the first time, you will be prompted to set up Duo.

Going forward, you will use Duo to verify your identity whenever you sign into KSUmail, D2L, and most other KSU services.

Your KSU Password

Keep your password private! Never share your KSU password with anyone, even if a person says they work for KSU. (UITS will never ask for your password.)

Tips for Creating an Effective Password:

- **1. Complexity is key**: Incorporate a mix of numbers, special characters, and uppercase and lowercase letters. Avoid simple or guessable patterns like "password1234."
- 2. Uniqueness matters: Use a different password for each account.
- **3. Length is strength**: The longer your password is, the better. Each password should include at least 12 characters.
- **4. Phrases may outperform words**: Consider using memorable phrases or short sentences as passwords—and remember to include numbers and special characters, as well.
- **5. Passwords should be updated regularly**: Change your password every 6–12 months, at a minimum. If you suspect your account has been compromised, change your password immediately. Please note that your KSU password expires yearly. You will receive email reminders via KSUmail starting 30 days prior to the expiration date.

Changing Your Password

As noted above, your KSU password expires yearly, and you will receive email reminders via KSUmail. However, you can change your password prior to the automatic expiration date by logging in to netid.kennesaw.edu.

What To Do if You Receive an Unexpected Duo Prompt?

IMPORTANT: If you ever receive a Duo notification at a time when you're not logging into a KSU application, deny the request and immediately reset your password at netid.kennesaw.edu.

To begin using the KSU VPN, follow these instructions to download and install the VPN software, GlobalProtect, on the device you will be using to remotely access KSU services and/or your office desktop.

Avoiding Phishing

Phishing is the practice of sending fraudulent emails purporting to be from trusted individuals or companies in order to induce individuals to reveal personal information, such as passwords and credit card numbers. Don't take the bait!

If you have mistakenly provided credentials to a confirmed phishing email, please change your NetID password immediately at netid. kennesaw.edu. If you receive a suspicious email not currently in the Phish Market, please forward it to abuse@kennesaw.edu.

Assess Every Email! Follow these tips:


- 1. Look for [EXTERNAL] in the email subject line. This indicates that the email may come from a non-KSU sender. Does the email address end in "@kennesaw.edu"? If not, the email may be a phishing attempt.
- 2. Don't automatically trust an email sender's display name. Even if the name displayed matches the name of a person you know, check the email address to confirm the sender. Any email claiming to be an employee of the university that does not originate from email ending in "@kennesaw.edu" should arouse your suspicion, especially if it claims to be from a person in a leadership position.
- **3. Check (but don't click) the links to web sites.** Hover your cursor over links in the message and note the address. Does the address make sense and match the rest of the content of the email? For example, links to most KSU or USG sites will include kennesaw.edu or usg.edu. The same is typically true of other companies.
- **4. Check for errors.** Attackers are often less careful about spelling or grammar than legitimate senders.
- **5.** Be cautious about attachments. Do not click on attachments that are unexpected or from unknown senders.
- **6.** Beware of urgency. Remember that scammers might try to make it sound as if there is an emergency (e.g., someone needs money right away, your account has been compromised, or someone is in trouble). If the sender is trying to influence you to act quickly, it may be wise to slow down instead.
- **7. Take time to think it through.** Phishers can use company logos, professional photos, and even spoofed email addresses to make their attempts look more legitimate. Take extra caution in reviewing an email that you did not expect to receive and asks you to take action.




Phish Alert Report Button

Reporting suspicious emails is as simple as clicking the "Phish Alert Report" button in your KSUmail application and confirming your submission in the pop-up panel on the right-hand side of the screen.

The Phish Alert Report button can look slightly different based on whether you're using Outlook on the Web (ksumail.kennesaw. edu), the Outlook app on your computer, or Outlook for mobile devices. Familiarize yourself with the variations:







Phish Market

The <u>KSU Phish Market</u> is a selection of phishing attempts made on members of the KSU community. We collect them online for you to peruse so that you are familiar with their foul smell when they hit your inbox.

FAQ:

Q: What happens when I click the Phish Alert Report Button?

A: When you click the "Phish Alert Report" button, another pop-up on the right-hand side of the screen will confirm your choice to report the email. The email will then be deleted from your inbox and forwarded to the Email Security Team for investigation.

Q: What happens if I made a mistake in clicking the Phish Alert Report button and need to access a reported email?

A: If you need to access a message that has been reported, the message can be found in that user's "Deleted Items" folder until it is emptied-which makes the deletion permanent, similar to any other deleted message. As long as the message is still in the "Deleted Items" folder, it can be moved back to the user's inbox.

Q: What if I'm not sure whether an email is a phishing attempt?

A: It's always best to err on the side of caution. If you are unable to verify a sender's unusual or suspicious request in-person, by phone, or through a Teams message, you can report that message by clicking the Phish Alert Report and confirming your submission on the pop-up panel on the right-hand side of the screen. You can also check the Phish Market site for information about any ongoing, campus-wide alerts.



The USG requires all Kennesaw State University employees, including student assistants, to complete Cybersecurity Awareness Training twice annually. You will receive instructions and links via email, and UITS will also post reminders in the KSU Weekly Feed and on social media.

Cybersecurity Awareness Training is available on KnowBe4, the USG-provided cybersecurity training platform, which can be accessed via a link during the designated time period. Cybersecurity Awareness Training is one of the few mandatory trainings not completed in OwlTrain. (See page 40 for more information about OwlTrain.)


Faculty Services

Please note that courses added to your roster by the registrar typically populate in Owl Express several weeks before they appear in D2L. (For students, classes typically appear in D2L on the day of the first class meeting.)







Printing and Scanning

Printing

KSU offers many options to print documents. Depending on your department, you might have Ricoh printers, network printers, or individual printers. You can inquire directly with your supervisor or department admin to find out if your department uses a network printer, Ricoh, or both.

*For personal printing or copying, faculty and staff can load KCash to their Talon Card to pay for copying and printing at a convenience copier located around campus.

Individual printer

If you wish to have an individual printer, depending on your requirements you can either submit a Service Request for an approved printer (see <u>page 19</u>) or purchase one by following the process described in the Non-Standard Technology Hardware and Software section (see <u>page 22</u>).



To use your printer, simply connect the cord to your device and follow the installation prompts on your device. You may have to download the drivers for your printer model at HP's website. KSU does not permit wireless connection for individual printers on campus.



Network printer

Ricoh printers are maintained by KSU Campus Services. To use a Ricoh printer, you will need to use your Talon One Card.

Follow these steps to order Ricoh supplies in Service Now:

- Navigate to <u>service.kennesaw.edu/technology</u>.
- Select Service Request.
- In the left-hand menu, select Copy Print Support.
- Select **<u>Ricoh Printer Supply Request</u>** and complete the form to submit your request.

For network or individual printers, you place orders through the department or for office supplies. Your department will be charged for all supplies ordered.

Network printer

If your department uses network printers, your supervisor will request access to printers for you by completing a form in ServiceNow.

Follow these steps to grant someone on your team access to the network printer:

- Navigate to service.kennesaw.edu/technology.
- Select Service Request.
- In the left-hand menu, select Copy Print Support.
- Select Copy/Print Speed Chart Add/Remove Form and complete the form to submit your request.

Comprehensive Ricoh printer locations and instructions can be found on the Printing Services website.

For individual printers, refer to instructions for your model at the HP website. Usually, a scanning software is required for scanning to your HP device and can be downloaded at the HP website.

UITS does not provide or support faxing. Some departments may purchase faxing software to use in conjunction with individual scanners or printers. You can also transmit files scanned at a Ricoh printer to email.

If you want to print high-quality brochures, booklets, high quantities, or large formats, the Campus Print Shop does an excellent job. Contact them for a quote.

If your design includes the KSU logo, you will need to request <u>Design approval</u> from Strategic Communications.

E-Signature: DocuSign

Use DocuSign, a browser-based tool for obtaining electronic signatures, when you want to document a legally binding agreement.

Docusign can be used to . . .

- Import existing documents for the purpose of obtaining electronic signatures and/or text entry elements.
- Send and receive electronic documents.
- Create workflows for documents requiring multiple signatures.

Access to Qualtrics

All KSU faculty and staff have access to Qualtrics; your account will be automatically created the first time you log in using your KSU credentials at survey.kennesaw.edu.

To request the use of Qualtrics on behalf of a student researcher, faculty must submit an Application Access Request by following these instructions:

- Navigate to service.kennesaw.edu.
- Select **Service Request**.
- Select **Technology Access** from the left-hand menu.
- Select **Application Access Request** and complete the form.

Once you have submitted this form, UITS will handle the request quickly, typically within 1-2 business days.

An approved protocol is not needed to submit a Qualtrics account request, but student accounts must be requested by a faculty member on their behalf.



The A.L. Burruss Institute of Public Service and Research can help set up the survey and provides additional services like conducting Focus Groups, analyzing the collected data, and preparing a report of the data.

Information Technology Projects

UITS is responsible for information technology (IT) projects at KSU. To fulfill this responsibility, which is delegated by the USG, we collaborate with faculty and staff to effectively and methodically create new technology-related products and services, and to implement major upgrades to existing ones.

IT Project Requests

An IT project request is a request for a technology update or change that is beyond a standard service request, involves multiple departments, or requires complex planning and troubleshooting to accomplish. Any faculty or staff member can submit an IT project request.

After you submit an IT project request, UITS will review it and a UITS team member will reach out to learn more about your request and your business processes. Next, the IT project request will be reviewed by UITS leadership. Finally, your project will be prioritized based on input from the President's Cabinet and placed in the queue.

Please note: The earlier a project request is submitted, the sooner UITS can help guide the plan and shape the project, ensuring an effective outcome.

Research Technology

UITS is committed to providing students, faculty, and staff researchers with access to the latest technology necessary for collaborative research and innovation at KSU. These resources are woven into the fabric of the University's infrastructure, enhancing the student learning experience and empowering all Owls to push the boundaries of knowledge and discovery.



Each campus is equipped with a high-speed network connection known as 100 Gigabit Ethernet. This advanced technology allows researchers to send and receive data at incredibly fast speeds, specifically up to 100 gigabits per second. Such a rapid rate is ideal for academic research, where handling extensive datasets efficiently is often required.

Southern Crossroads (SoX)

In 2023, KSU joined the CDC, Georgia Tech, Vanderbilt University Medical Center, and other leading research institutions in establishing high-speed pathways to Internet2 and other heavily used commercial content providers. This allows for rapid sharing of large amounts of data with other research organizations, facilitating real-time collaboration between researchers at KSU and other participating institutions worldwide.




KSU's <u>High Performance Computing (HPC)</u> resources are key to the University's research infrastructure. These HPC are designed to handle massive datasets and perform intricate simulations, enabling student, faculty, and staff researchers to perform complex computational tasks and large-scale data analysis across disciplines.

You do not need to take any extra steps to use this network connection; you are directly using these connections any time you are on campus and access internet-based resources.



Data Management



All individuals utilizing University technology resources must comply with KSU's Data Security Policy, viewable at the <u>Policy at KSU webpage</u>. This policy has been created to protect sensitive University data, including the personal data of students and employees, and is essential for compliance with federal, state, and the University System of Georgia data security regulations.

While some data use is programmatically monitored, these data management solutions do not necessarily enforce compliance with KSU's Data Security Policy. It is the individual's responsibility to ensure that data is stored, collected, and/or transferred using the available tools in accordance with all policy and legal requirements.

Shared network drives (I, M) are designated storage drives on the campus network. Access to folders on shared drives can be granted to individuals or groups of individuals. Shared network drives are the only solution available for storing confidential data on a network. Confidential data stored on a shared network drive must have a designated custodian; please contact the Office of Cybersecurity for more information. Shared network drives are accessible on campus and off campus using the KSU VPN.




